3.Accommodation

The accommodation will accommodate all the athletes and team officials of the Sea Games for a period of 12 Days, from 11 to 22 November 2011. An additional pre-opening period of 7 days has been scheduled from 4 until 7 November 2011 to enable the Chefs De Mission of the NOC's to complete the administrative matters prior to the arrival of their teams.

The accommodation for all the athletes and team officials will be classified as in South Sumatera will be accommodated in the Athletes Village while in Jakarta will be in hotels.

4.Accreditation

4.1.Process

The organization of a great sporting event, such as the SEA Games, necessitates strict access control to all official INASOC venues, zones, and areas. This will be achieved through ticket allocation to spectators and by accreditation to athletes and those with official job function.

Every approved responsible organization will complete the accreditation application process on behalf of its delegation, including the receipt and distribution of the appropriate accreditation cards to each participant before travelling to Palembang, South Sumatera and Jakarta. Upon arrival in Palembang, South Sumatera and Jakarta, participants must validate their cards (see Validation).

All participants must be accurately registered and duly accredited through the INASOC accreditation process in order to take part in the SEA Games.

4.2.Validation

Participants must present their accreditation cards, accompanied by either a valid passport, National Identity Card (Indonesian nationals), or other approved means of identity to the validation desk at the Palembang, South Sumatera and Jakarta International Airport or at an INASOC primary accreditation centre as specified in the Accreditation Manual.

Validation involves:

- electronic activation in the accreditation system; changing the card status to 'live'
- physical activation; changing the card appearance to distinguish it from non-valid cards.

4.3.Lost, Damaged, or Stolen Cards

Lost accreditation cards must be reported immediately to the approved authority of the responsible organization. The approved authority concerned must then apply to INASOC for a replacement card, stating the circumstances of the loss. A replacement card will only be issued with the approval of INASOC.

Lost damaged or stolen cards will be cancelled immediately and will not be reactivated: even if recovered.

5.Transportation

A comprehensive transport system for athletes, team officials and technical officials will be available exclusively for the SEA Games. This will include:

- arrival service from Palembang, South Sumatera and Jakarta International Airport to the accommodation
- regularly scheduled shuttle service from accommodation to official competition and training venues
- dedicated service to opening and closing ceremonies
- dedicated service to all official functions and/ or meetings
- departure service from the accommodation to Palembang, South Sumatera and Jakarta International Airport

Buses will provide the following services.

Transportation services for the sports delegation upon arrival and departure

Providing shuttle bus for delegates to and from matches / training of hotel

Special vehicles for NOCs

Provision of Transport for the Opening Ceremony and Closing Ceremony.

Transport Provision for Special Events

Provision of Transport for NOCs in attending a Special Event

Transport Provision for Official activities

Transport Provision for Technical Officials, VIPs and media.

Provision of Transport for INASOC.

6.Uniforms

INASOC will provide all technical officials, staff members and volunteers with appropriate attire and uniforms.

A sizing form will be sent in advance to all parties concerned. Forms must be returned and received by INASOC before the given deadline to ensure availability.

The uniforms will be distributed at the main uniform and accreditation centre after collecting the accreditation.

7.Medical Services

A first aid and emergency first response medical service will be provided during the South East Asia Games to any person requiring medical assistance. This service will operate in official SEA Games competition and training venues during official operating hours. This service will comprise a dedicated medical team supported by an ambulance service.

8.Sports Information Centre

One main sports information centre will be located inside the Accommodations and a sports information desk will be located in each of the competition venues.

9.General Weather Conditions

As a tropical countries, Indonesia only has two (2) seasons which are rainy and dry season. During the month of October until December will be rainy season. The average daytime temperature is between 29 – 32 degrees celcius. In general, the weather is perfect for achieving the best competition results.

V. GENERAL NOTICES LOCAL REGULATIONS

Paragliding Competition

INASOC 2011

1) Event and Dates

The 26th SEA Games Indonesia 2011

Paragliding Competition will be held from 12 - 22 November 2011.

2) Venues

a) Competition Site

The competition will be held at Naringgul Hill, Gunung Mas Puncak – Bogor, Jawa Barat – Indonesia.

b) Training Site

The training will be held at Naringgul Hill, Gunung Mas Puncak – Bogor, Jawa Barat – Indonesia.

The training schedule for each team will be given upon the arrival.

3) Competition Disciplines

a) There will be three:

- Accuracy
- Race to Goal
- Open Distance

b) Every pilot must compete in all disciplines.

4) Medals in Every Competition Disciplines

a) Top 3 Male.

b) Top 3 Female.

c) Top 3 Nation Male.

d) Top 3 Nation Female.

e) Male competition & Female competition are different rankings (Olympic rule).

5) Entry

a) The Championship is open to all SEA GAMES participants countries.

b) Each country may enter any number of paragliding pilots not exceeding 5 male pilots and 5 female pilots.

c) Each country may have reserve pilot, maximum reserve is 2 male pilots and 2 female pilots.

d) All entries must be made on the official Entry Form, signed by NAC representative.

6) Registration

- a) On arrival the Team Leader and team members must report to registration office to have their document checked and to receive supplementary regulation and information.
- b) The End of the registration is considered to be the official start of the championship.

7) Pilot Documentation Required

- a) Pilot / Team registration form.
- b) Evidence of pilot nationality (copy of passport).
- c) Evidence of pilot qualification (NAC license / Sporting license / IPPI card)
- d) Entry form signed by Team leader
- e) Certificate of insurance

8) Equipment

Each pilot must equip with;

- a) Gliders (passed LTF / DHV or internationally recognized certifying bodies) can be used
 - (1) Certified gliders up to LTF 2-3 or equivalent can be used in this competition.
 - (2) Pilots are able to use the different glider for each disciplines.
- b) Harness (certified to EN1651 and LTF09 or equivalent)
- c) Reserve parachute (passed LTF / DHV or test certification body)
- d) Helmet (recommended certified to EN966 (HPG))
- e) GPS.
- f) Shoes.
- g) Radio VHF (2 meters radio) is mandatory either directly or through the team leaders.
Safety frequency ; 149.19 and Organizer ; 149.39
- h) Mobile Telephones

All pilots must have a mobile phone that can be used in Indonesia with Local number.
GSM/CDMA phones can be used in Indonesia.

9) Pilots Briefing

- a) There will be a daily briefing for pilots & team leaders each morning at take off.
- b) Briefings may be postponed or reconvened in the event of bad weather, and times will be announced and posted on the notice board. All pilots, team leaders and other personnel should attend briefings promptly.
- c) Team Leader briefings will be announced at the daily briefing and posted on the notice board.

10) Weight Limit

- + 33 kg in addition to pilots weight

11) Pre-Fliers – Free Flyers

- a) The official Championships pre-fliers will be notified to all pilots at the first competition briefing. They will be experienced pilots familiar with the local sites, who understand the importance of their role in the Championships. They will not be competitors.
- b) There will be no free-flying allowed from the Competition site in use, either during the competition or during a stand down, either by competition pilots or by free flyers, except at the end of the Competition day, when declared by the Launch Marshall/Competition Director.

VI. COMPETITION RULES & REGULATIONS

1.LOCAL REGULATION FOR PARAGLIDING ACCURACY INASOC 2011

1) Site

Location : Naringgul Hill, Gunung Mas Puncak – Bogor, Jawa Barat – Indonesia
Take Off Altitude : 1250 m asl
Landing altitude : 1000 m asl

2) Number of Rounds (Accuracy)

- a) The maximum number of rounds will be 12.
- b) Minimum validation is 1 round.

3) Priority or Launch Order

- a) On the first day of competition all pilots will be entered in a draw to determine priority or launch order.
- b) The next days of competition, the general ranking will determine the priority.
- c) When the final round of the competition is called, pilots should launch in reverse order of their current competition position.
- d) The organizer will provide numbers for each pilot which must be displayed on gliders (middle of lower surface) and helmet.

4) Take Off

Foot launch from hill side

- a) Competitors must have good nil-wind as well as strong wind take-off skills.
- b) At the Launch Meet Director's discretion, a pilot may be temporarily stood down or permanently withdrawn from the competition if he/she appears unable to launch safely in wind and weather conditions that fall within operating limits.
- c) A failed take-off attempt or safety problem arising immediately after take-off (and which is not a result of pilot's poor pre-flight check) which results in a landing at take-off, or away from the target, will be eligible for a re-launch for that round when allowed by Meet Director .

- d) Competitors must follow the priority or launch order.
- e) Competitors not ready to fly in the established flying order when called forward to launch by the Launch Marshall, or who take off without the Launch Marshall's permission, will be liable to a maximum score.
- f) A pilot who is not present at launch will be marked ABS in the results of that round and a maximum score will be recorded.
- g) A pilot who did not fly will be indicated as DNF in the results for that round and a maximum score will be recorded.
- h) The average launch interval is 90 seconds/pilot

5) Flying Time

- a) Pilot should land approximately in the same order as take off.
- b) Pilots must fly to the target as soon as they have enough height.

6) Final Approach (Accuracy)

- a) Competitors should be afforded a fair attempt at a target landing. They should have sufficient time during the flight to reach the target area directly from launch, to make a considered final approach to the target.

7) Landing for Accuracy

- a) Competitors will be scored according to the distance in centimeters between the first point of ground contact with their body and the edge of the dead center disc to a maximum score of 1000 cm.
- b) The measuring Field will have clearly marked circles set at 2.5m, 5m, and 10m
- c) Landing must be made on the feet. Falling is not allowed and a maximum score will be recorded, if the competitors fall.
- d) Fall means if any part of the body or equipment (excluding speed system) touches the ground before the wing does.
- e) If competitor's lands with both feet together and the first point of contact cannot be determined, then the furthest point of the footprint is measured
- f) A pilot landing outside the target area must report to the Judging Team as soon as possible. Failure to do so may invalidate any claim for a re-flight.

8) Signals for Landing Accuracy

- a) The official signal for pilots in the air to fly away from the target for safety reasons will be the waving of a red signal flag by event judge in the measuring field or by an order from the radio.
- b) Competitors will be permitted to re launch if the signal waved because of two pilots approach target in the same time.

9) Scoring

- a) Individual scores shall be an aggregate of all scores achieved by that competitor. When five or more valid rounds are completed, the worst score is dropped.

- b) The winner shall be the pilot gaining the lowest aggregate score across all the rounds flown in the Competition.
- c) If any team has less than three competitors, then a maximum score will be awarded to the team for each round for each of the scores for which there is no competitor.
- d) Each nation's team score for each round will be calculated as the aggregate score of the best 3 pilots.
- e) There is no dropping of the worst score in team scoring.
- f) As soon as is practical at the end of the round, the recorder will post the scores on the main notice board. These will be marked Provisional, with the posting time and date clearly visible. Any complaint against the Provisional scores must be lodged within 2 hours of the scores being posted.

10) Reserve Pilots

- a) Reserve pilot may only participate in the competition if the team's main pilot has obstructed to continue participating in the competition (e.g. injured due to an accidents).
- b) The pilot that's been replaced by reserve pilot is not allowed to compete in the rest of the competition.
- c) Reserve pilots' score can only be contributed to Nation's score.

11) Judging

Judging Team

- a) The Chief Judge and Event Judge will be qualified persons appointed by the championship organizer. They will have experience of judging at international Paragliding Accuracy competitions and at least one will be a current paragliding accuracy pilot.
- b) In addition there should be seven further suitably qualified members of the judging team, plus a minimum of two reserves to allow for rotation of duties and relief. Judging team members can be from any nation, but there must be at least two nations represented in the judging team at the target at any time.

12) Safety Committee

- a) A safety committee will be appointed. At the first briefing, a safety committee will be formed. It is recommended the Safety Committee includes: meet Director (or his deputy), Launch Marshall (or Deputy), senior member of Judging Team, minimum of two experienced participating pilots (one of them a foreign pilot).
- b) The safety Officer's responsibility will be to monitor all aspects of safety. This includes but is not limited to:
 - (1) Addressing all pilots at a specific safety briefing.
 - (2) Attending all pilot briefings.
 - (3) Checking meteorological condition especially wind speed at launch and target.
 - (4) Checking pilot separation.
 - (5) Preventing pilot launching with unsafe equipment.
 - (6) Collecting accident reports.
 - (7) Discussing incidents with technical delegate and presenting conclusions at pilots briefings.

(8) The Safety Officer in conjunction with the meet Director may stop the competition for reasons of safety. Any decision taken by him will be reported to the Jury president.

13) Emergency Procedures

One English speaking emergency doctor and an ambulance with appropriate equipment will be available during all operations. Expected response time for evacuation by ambulance to the hospital in Cisarua/Cipanas is 30 minutes.

14) Radio Transceivers

- a) Every pilot must fly with VHF (2 meters radio)
- b) Radios are not to be used for the purpose of providing advantageous competitive information or for coaching.
- c) Radios or other communication devices are not to be used during competition flights, other than foremergencies. Only frequencies allocated by the organisers may be used.
- d) The official frequency during the competition and the safety frequency will be announced at the first Pilot briefing.

15) Complaints and Protests

- a) Written complaint may be made to the Competition Director or his deputy by team leader. It should be made within 30 minutes and it will be dealt with expeditiously.
- b) If the complainant is not satisfied with the outcome, the team leader may make a protest in writing to the Competition Director or his deputy.
- c) The time limit for protest is 1 hour after notification of the result of the complaint. The protest fee is Rp. 1.000.000,-. It will be returned if the protest is upheld.

16) Priority in the air

Pilot must follow strictly the priority rules.

17) Penalties

All penalties will be decided by Meet director after advice of Technical Delegate.

18) Rules Reference

- a) Accuracy section 7c.
- b) Local rules takes precedence.

2.LOCAL REGULATION FOR PARAGLIDING CROSS COUNTRY INASOC 2011.

1) Site

Location : Naringgul Hill, Gunung Mas Puncak – Bogor, Jawa Barat – Indonesia.
Take Off Altitude : 1300 m asl
Landing altitude : 1000 m asl

2) Tasks

- a) Race to goal.
- b) Open Distance

Tasks will be decided by the Meet Director with Technical delegate advice.

3) Number of Tasks

- a) No maximum number of tasks.
- b) Minimum for validation 1 task

4) Radio Transceivers

- b) Every pilot must fly with VHF (2 meters radio)
- c) Radios are not to be used for the purpose of providing advantageous competitive information or for coaching.
- d) Radios or other communication devices are not to be used during competition flights, other than for emergencies. Only frequencies allocated by the organisers may be used.
- e) The official frequency during the competition and the safety frequency will be announced at the first Pilot briefing.

5) Reserve Pilots

- a) Reserve pilot may only participate in the competition if the team's main pilot has obstructed to continue participating in the competition (e.g. injured due to an accidents).
- b) The pilot that's been replaced by reserve pilot is not allowed to compete in the rest of the competition.
- c) Reserve pilots' score can only be contributed to Nation's score.

6) Launch method

- a) Foot launch from hill side
- b) In this competition an ordered launch method will be used.

7) Retake-Off

- a) A competitor will be allowed 1 take-off to attempt the task within the stated take-off period.

- b) A failed take-off attempt or safety problem arising immediately after take-off which results in a landing will not count as one of the permitted number of take-offs.
- c) However, the pilot's take-off time will be taken from the time of the first take-off attempt if a ground start is specified.

8) Task Period.

- a) Times of window open for take-off and times for the closing of the window, turn points and last landing will be displayed in writing. Any window extension policy will also be displayed in writing.
- b) Launch Window Extension Time will be announced at the task briefing and may only be used when the launch has been closed for safety reasons.

9) Thermaling

All pilots must read and understand Chapter 16 of S7b, Thermalling Rules and Procedures.

10) Scoring

- a) Scoring parameters will be decided at the first team leader briefing.
- b) The object of the scoring system is to reward pilots for their performances as fairly as possible.
- c) The team score calculation is the daily sum of the scores of the 3 best pilot scores from the entire team on each task.
- d) If any team has less than three competitors, then a minimum score will be awarded to the team for each task for each of the scores for which there is no competitor.
- e) As soon as is practical at the end of the task, the organizer will post the scores on the main notice board. These will be marked Provisional, with the posting time and date clearly visible. Any complaint against the Provisional scores must be lodged within 2 hours of the scores being posted.

11) Rest Days

The policy on rest days shall be declared before the first competition day.

12) Penalties

All penalties will be decided by meet director after advice of the technical delegate.

13) Complaints and Protests

- a) Written complaint may be made to the Competition Director or his deputy by team leader. It should be made within 30 minutes and it will be dealt with expeditiously.
- b) If the complainant is not satisfied with the outcome, the team leader may make a protest in writing to the Competition Director or his deputy.
- c) The time limit for protest is 1 hour after notification of the result of the complaint. The protest fee is Rp. 1.000.000,-. It will be returned if the protest is upheld.

14) Rules reference

- a) Section 7b
- b) Local rules takes precedence.

15) Entries

Preliminary Entry (Entry By Number)

Each participating OCA member (NOCs) must completed and submit preliminary entry forms (Entry by Number) to INASOC no later than 31 June 2011 at 2400Hours (GMT+7) Jakarta local time.

Final Entry (Entry By Name)

The entry forms (Entry by Name) must be received by INASOC no later than 31 September 2011 at 2400Hours (GMT+7) Jakarta local time.
